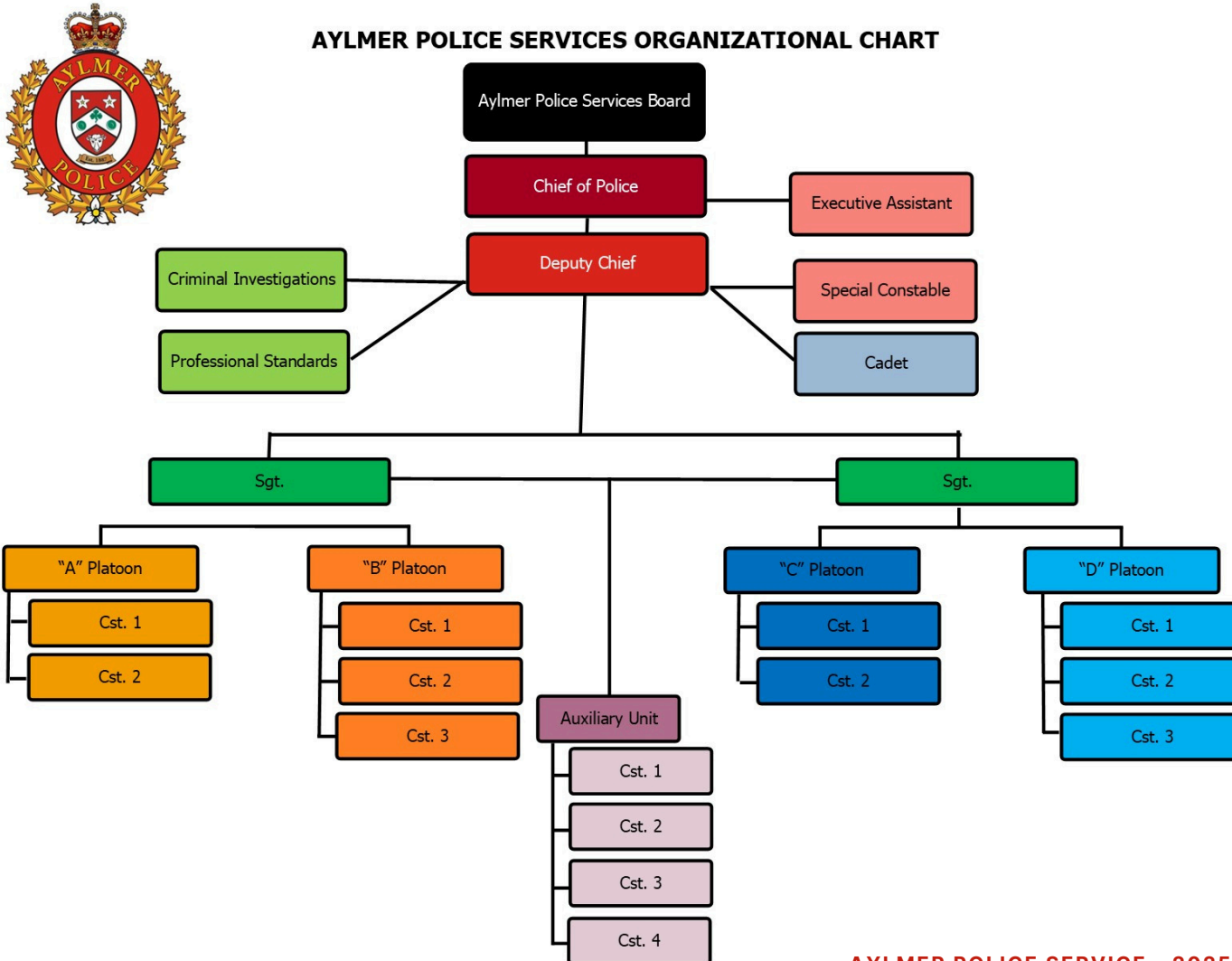


# ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Aylmer Police Service is led by the Chief of Police, support by a Deputy Chief, an Executive Assistant, and one Special Constable.

The operational structure includes Criminal Investigations and Professional Standards units, along with two Sergeants overseeing four platoons: "A" (2 Constables), "B" (3 Constables), "C" (2 Constables), and "D" (3 Constables).

Additionally, there are four Auxiliary Constables on the Auxiliary Unit. The Aylmer Police Service Board provides governance and oversight.

Congratulations to Chief Johnstone and Chief Horvat.



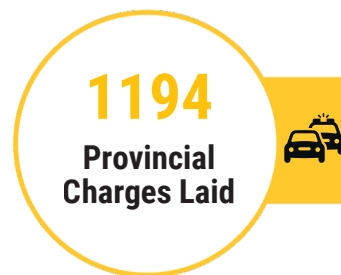

# CRIME SEVERITY INDEX

## Crime Severity Index (CSI) – 2024

The Crime Severity Index is a weighted score produced by Statistics Canada based on the type of reported crime in a community. Types of crime are weighted, meaning that more serious and violent crimes are given a higher individual score than crimes considered to be less serious in nature. The CSI allows for direct comparisons to be made across similarly sized communities in terms of violent crime, non-violent crime and total crime (violent and non-violent combined).

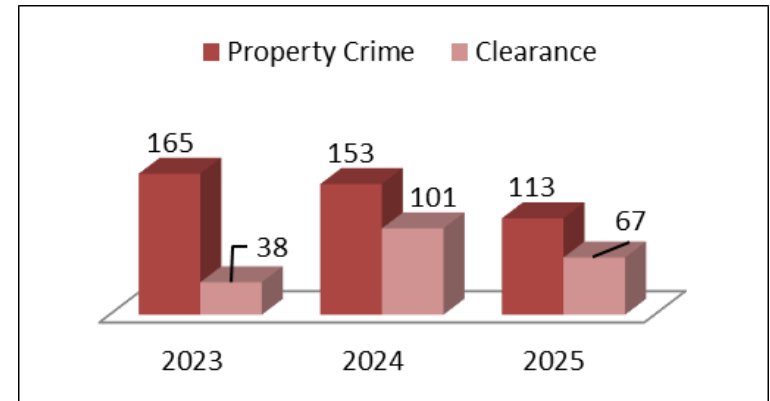

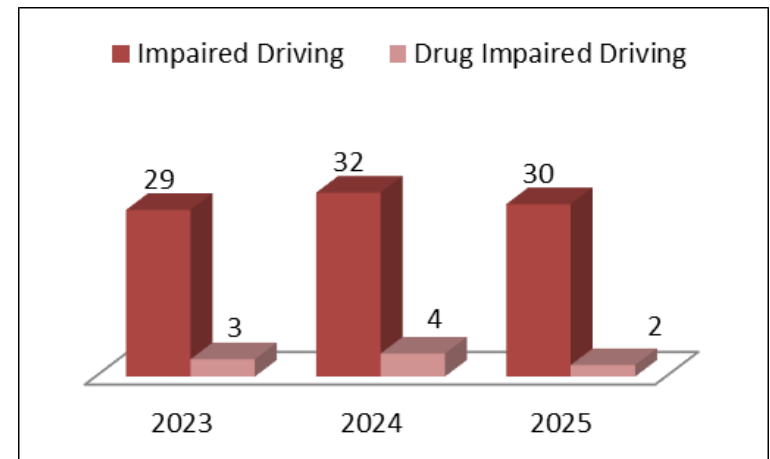

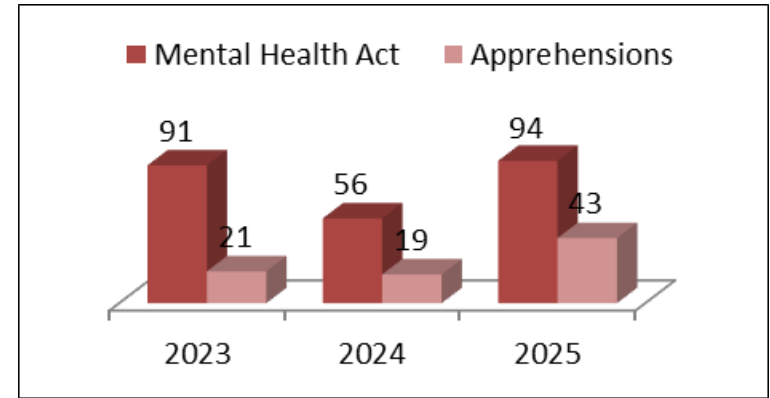

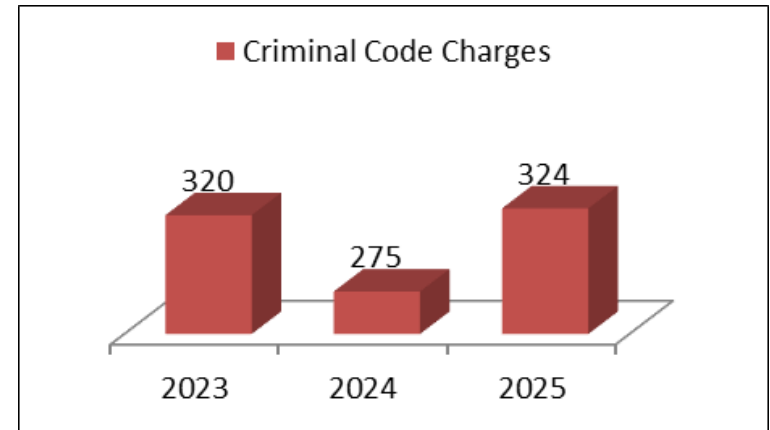

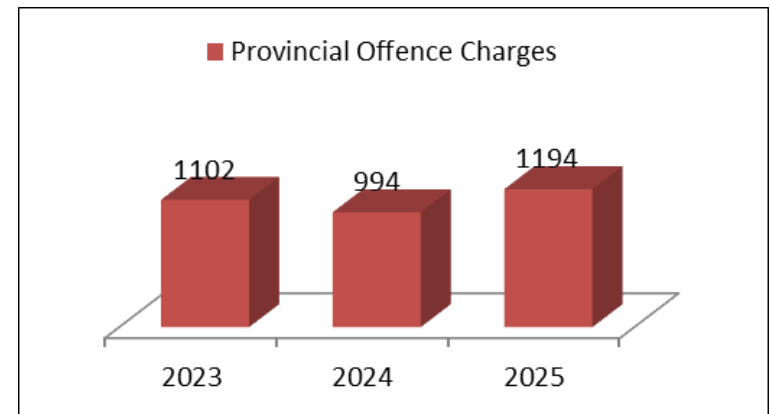
# CRIMINAL CODE CHARGES

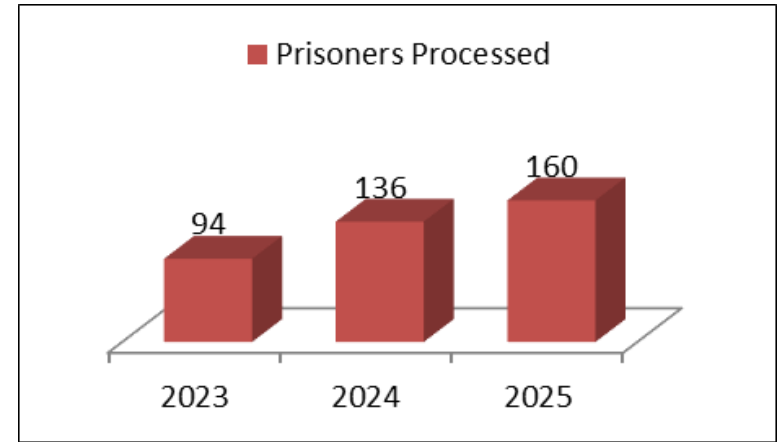
# PROVINCIAL OFFENCE CHARGES

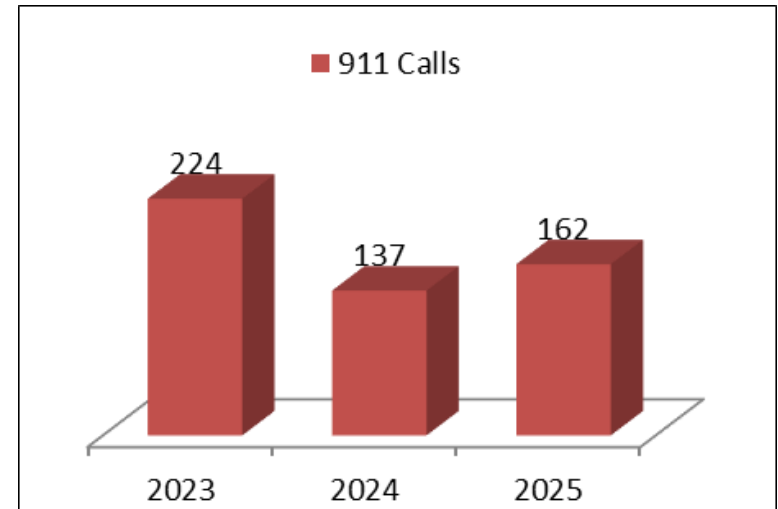
# PRISONERS PROCESSED

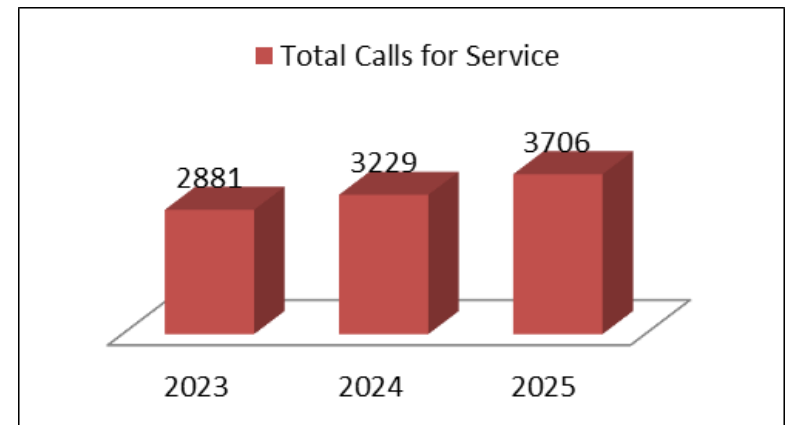
# 911 CALLS

# TOTAL CALLS FOR SERVICE

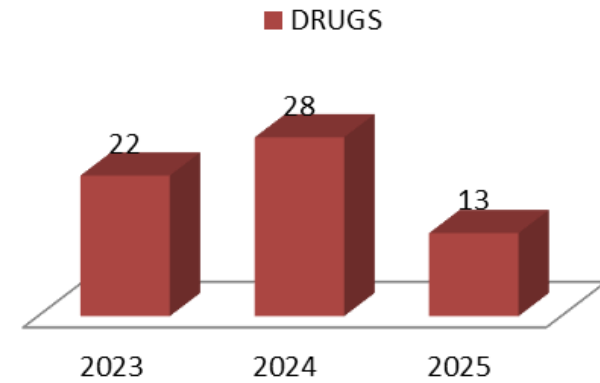

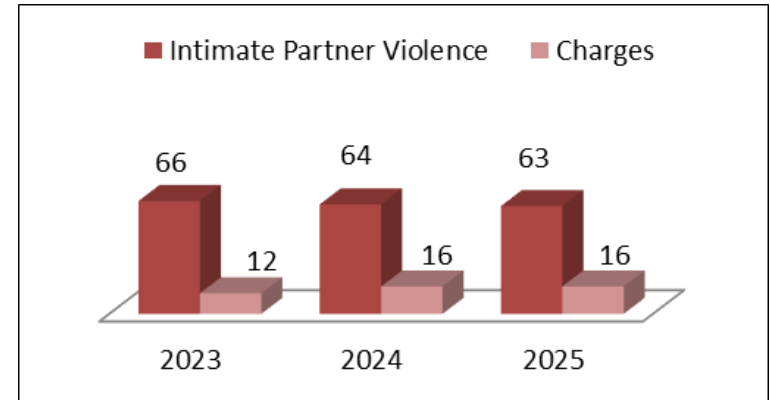

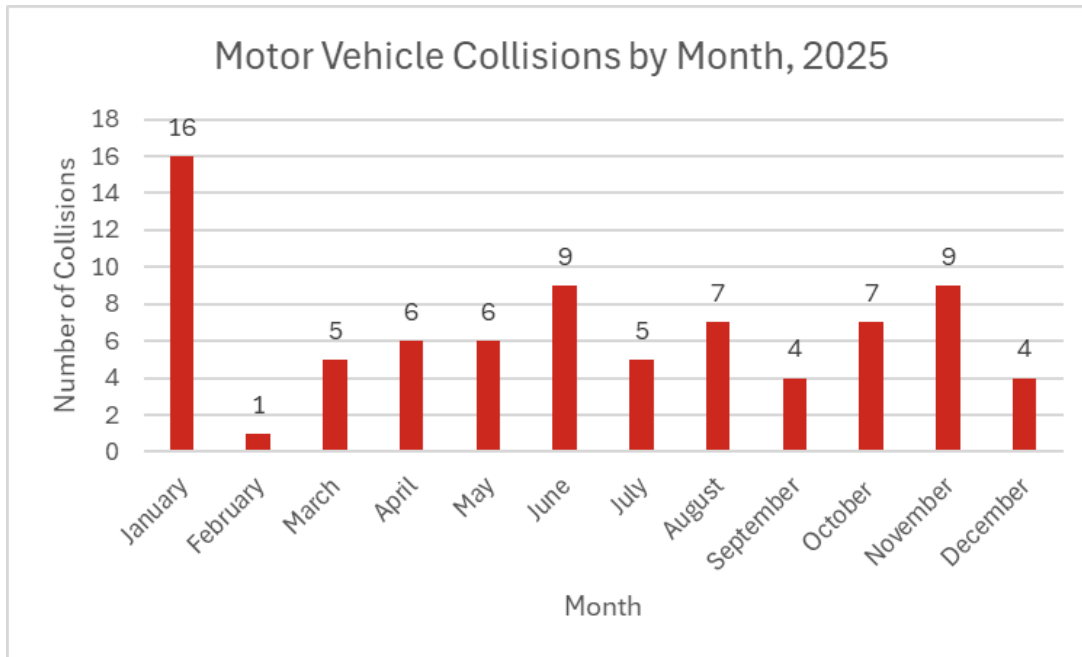

# 2025 NOTABLE INCIDENTS

## \$1.2 Million Fraud Investigation

A 54-year-old woman has been arrested in connection with a fraud investigation involving losses exceeding \$1.2 million. The investigation revealed that the accused befriended a local man and, without his knowledge or consent, deposited and cashed cheques made payable to herself. The suspicious activity was identified by a local accountant, who alerted the victim. The matter was subsequently reported to police. Following a lengthy investigation, the woman was charged with multiple fraud-related offences. The matter remains before the courts.

## Home Invasion and Robbery

A 28-year-old male has been arrested in connection with a robbery investigation in the Town of Aylmer. On September 16, 2025, Aylmer Police responded to a report of a robbery at a residence on John Street South, where a Facebook Marketplace transaction had been arranged for the sale of a hammer. During the interaction, the accused allegedly used force and made a threatening statement before fleeing the scene with two other males in a vehicle. The accused has been charged with robbery with violence and intimidation of a justice system participant. This matter remains before the courts.



# 2025 NOTABLE INCIDENTS

## Adult Male Assaults Infant Child

A 31-year-old male was arrested after an investigating that alleged an assault of an infant by the mother's current boyfriend. The investigation determined that the infant was assaulted on more than one occasion. The male was arrested and charged with assault causing bodily harm, suffocation, and assault. The accused was released from custody, the matter remains before the courts.

## Traffic Stop leads to Drug Trafficking Charges

A 36-year-old female has been charged following a traffic stop in Elgin County that led to the seizure of multiple controlled substances. On August 30, 2025, at approximately 2:07 a.m., police conducted a traffic stop on Bradley Creek Line at Hacienda Road in the Township of Malahide after observing a vehicle travelling at a high rate of speed. Officers observed cannabis readily accessible to the driver and not stored in original packaging, contrary to the Cannabis Control Act. Police seized fentanyl, cocaine, oxycodone, codeine tablets, with a street value of \$8000. As a result, the accused was charged with five counts of possession of a Schedule I substance for the purpose of trafficking, contrary to the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. The accused was held to answer to the charges, and the matter remains before the courts.



# SUSPECT APPREHENSION PURSUITS

**Suspect Apprehension Pursuits (SAP)** occur when a police officer attempts to direct the driver of a motor vehicle to stop. The driver refused to obey the officer and the officer pursues in a motor vehicle for the purposes of stopping the fleeing motor vehicle or identifying the fleeing motor vehicle or an individual in the fleeing motor vehicle. When police officers attempt to stop a motor vehicle, and the motor vehicle refuses to pull over, officers use discretion on initiating a pursuit or not. In either event, a fail to stop report is required by the Ministry.

## 2025

- In 2025, Aylmer Police engaged in no Suspect Apprehension Pursuits.
- On two (2) occasions, fail to stop reports were submitted by officers.
  - In both situations, vehicles attempted to be stopped for Highway Traffic Act offences fled from Police.
- In accordance with the legislation and Aylmer Police policy and procedures, all fail to stop occurrences are reviewed by a supervisor and training analyst.
- In all occurrences, the officers were deemed to have acted appropriately, favoring public safety and not initiating a pursuit.



# COLLECTION OF IDENTIFYING INFORMATION IN CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES

Pursuant to O. Reg. 400/23 of the Community Safety and Policing Act, an annual report must be provided by a municipal Chief of Police to a Board.

## 2025

- In 2025, no attempts or actual collection of information was made under this regulation.

# MISSING PERSON URGENT DEMAND REPORT

Pursuant to the *Missing Persons Act of Ontario*, Police Services are required to report on the number of times an “urgent demand” was made by Police.

## 2025

- In 2025, thirty-one (31) missing person reports were filed with the Aylmer Police Service.
- Five (5) required urgent demands for records.



# USE OF FORCE

Eleven (11) Use of Force reports were submitted in 2025 as per the provincial reporting regulations and the Aylmer Police Service Policy and Procedures.

## Use of Force Type and Reason:

- Three (3) reports were submitted by officers who drew a Conductive Energy Weapon (CEW). In one instance, the CEW was deployed during a response to a person in crisis who was at risk of serious self-harm involving an edged weapon. The use of the CEW was intended to prevent further injury and ensure the safety of all involved.
- Eight (8) reports were submitted for dispatching injured or sick wild animals (firearm).

The limited use of force by Aylmer Police Service officers is attributed to the introduction of body-worn cameras, the high level of training officers receive, strong community relationships, and a consistent focus on de-escalation.



**The Taser 7 has now been rolled out to most frontline officers after 18 units were obtained to replace the aged and end of life Taser X2 units.**

## SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT, 2025

The SIU is a civilian law enforcement agency, independent of the police, that conducts criminal investigations into circumstances involving police and civilians that have resulted in serious injury, death or allegations of sexual assault. In the course of its investigations, the Unit gathers and assesses evidence, and the Director of the SIU decides whether or not the evidence leads to the reasonable belief that a criminal offence has been committed. If the Director forms such a belief, she or he shall lay a criminal charge against the officer(s), and that charge will then be prosecuted by the Crown Attorney. If the Director does not form such a belief, she or he cannot lay a criminal charge against the officer(s).

2025

- In 2025, there were no SIU investigations.



# ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES

## Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act

The Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act provides citizens with a right of access to records within the custody or control of all municipal sector organizations, including Police Services. Access to these records is not absolute. There are certain mandatory and discretionary exemptions, which are applied. Details about the operation of the Act and interpretations of the 10 exemption provisions can be found at the website of the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner (IPC) [www.ipc.on.ca](http://www.ipc.on.ca)

The Aylmer Police Service Civilian Administrator is designated as the primary FOIA officer.

**The Aylmer Police processed three (3) requests in 2025.**

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## Record Checks

The three types of record checks include:

- **Police Criminal Record Check (PCRC)**
  - This check is intended for applicants who are involved as a volunteer, employee or in any situation where a BASIC Police Criminal Record Check is requested. This check is NOT intended for applicants who are seeking volunteer and/or employment with vulnerable persons.
- **Police Criminal Record and Judicial Matters Check (PCRJMC)**
  - Intended for applicants who are seeking volunteer and/or employment with agencies who require a police record check. This check is NOT intended for applicants who are seeking volunteer, student placement or employment with vulnerable persons (i.e. children, elderly).
- **Police Vulnerable Sector Check (PVSC)**
  - This check is restricted to applicants seeking employment, student placement, Foster Parent, Kinship Care or volunteering with vulnerable individuals. "Vulnerable Persons" means persons who, because of their age, a disability or other circumstances, whether temporary or permanent, (A) are in a position of dependence on others; or (B) are otherwise at a greater risk than the general population of being harmed by persons in a position of authority or trust relative to them.

**The Aylmer Police processed six hundred and twelve (612) Criminal Record Checks in 2025.**

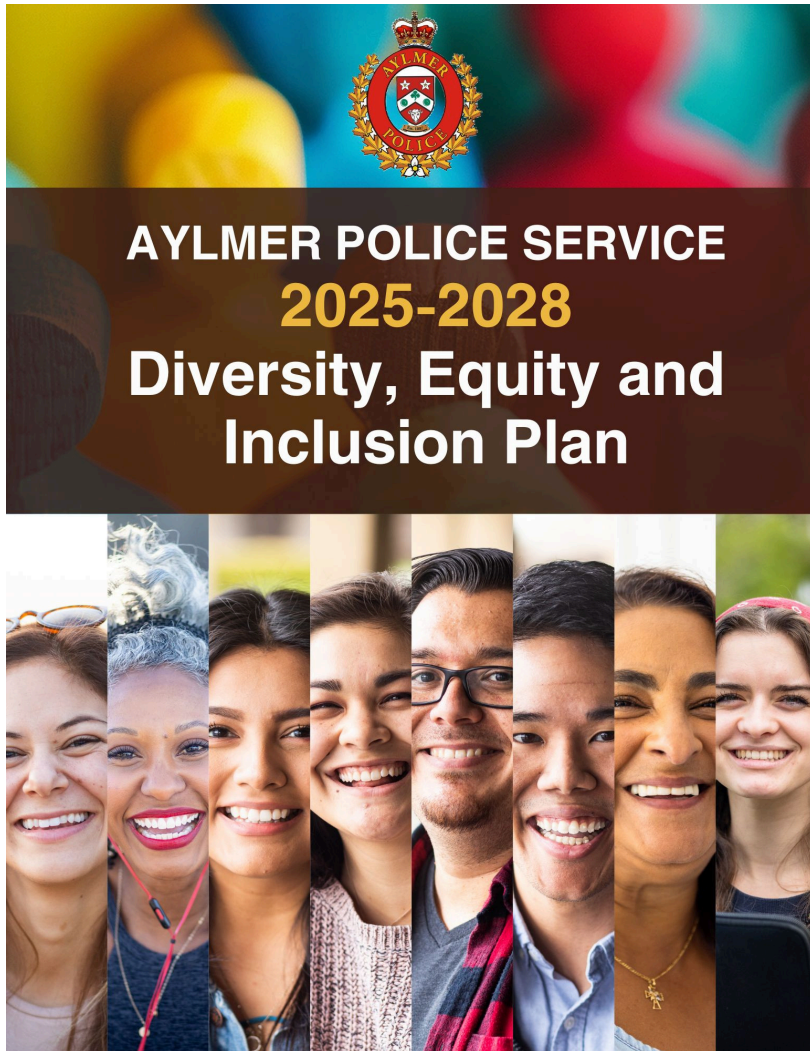
- **Visibility & Community Policing:** increased foot and vehicle patrols, traffic enforcement, crime investigation accountability, and response to drug abuse and homelessness;

# 2025-2028 DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION PLAN



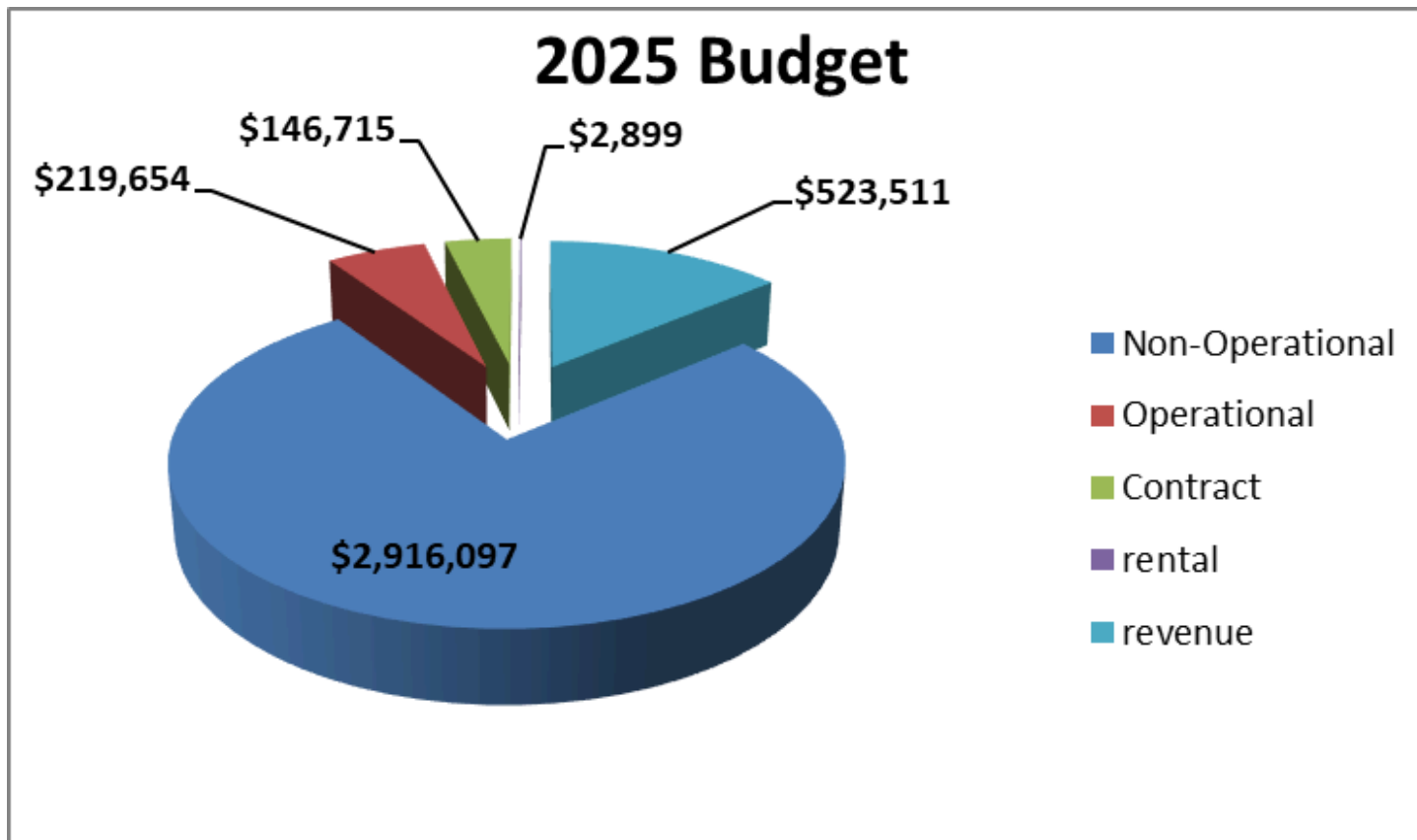
The **2025-2028 Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Plan** sets out a four-year framework to strengthen trust, fairness, and representation in policing across the community. Building on the Service's broader strategic plan, the plan focuses on four priority areas:

- **Visibility & Community Policing:** strengthening relationships with underrepresented groups, expanding community-oriented response models, and increasing liaison roles and non-enforcement interactions;
- **Community Engagement & Outreach:** deepening partnerships with Mennonite Community Services and other community organizations, improving victim supports, and ensuring inclusive language and accessible communications;
- **Facilities, Resources & Techology:** creating trauma-informed and accessible spaces, enhancing bias-free technology use such as body-worn cameras, and expanding DEI-focused training;
- **Organizational Effectiveness:** inclusive recruitment and promotion practices, mandatory training, policy bias reviews, and leadership accountability.

The plan emphasizes culturally responsive policing, equitable service delivery, and measurable actions to ensure the Service reflects and supports the diverse needs of the Aylmer community.

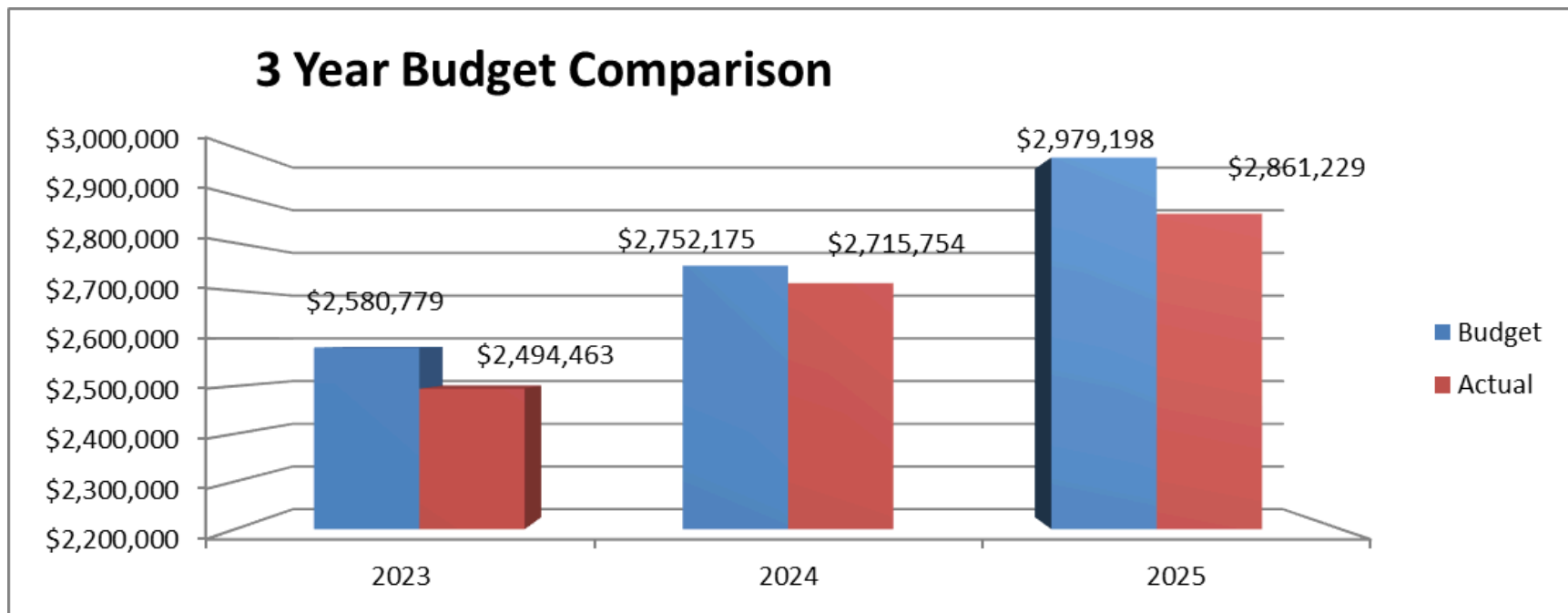
# 2025 BUDGET ANALYSIS

The **2025 Annual Financial Summary** shows steady budget growth over the past three years. Actual expenditures have remained below budget each year, with 2025 actual spending at \$2,861,229, reflecting continued fiscal control. Non-operational costs represent the largest portion of expenditures, rising for \$2.35 million in 2023 to \$2.92 million in 2025, while operational and contract costs have increased more moderately. Revenue has also grown significantly, helping offset overall costs. Overall, the data indicates responsible financial management alongside gradual increases in overall service expenditures.



# 2025 BUDGET ANALYSIS

A three-year comparison of the budget demonstrates steady and predictable financial growth from 2023 to 2025. The approved budget increased from \$2,580,779 in 2023 to \$2,752,175 in 2024, and further to \$2,979,198 in 2025, reflecting incremental adjustments to support operational needs and rising costs. In each year, actual expenditures remained below the approved budget - \$2,494,463 in 2023, \$2,715,754 in 2024, and \$2,861,229 in 2025 - indicating consistent fiscal discipline. Overall, the three-year trend shows responsible budgeting practices, modest annual growth, and effective cost containment.
